<p><b>Key Findings Summary:</b> (include any changes or deviations from original plan, also include program level outcomes if applicable)  <b>(6-21 Committee) developed a community survey that was distributed to over 50 programs asking them to describe programs that they provided. 22 agencies responded to the survey. Lack of low cost /no cost summer programs was identified. The committee worked with Andrews House to establish a summer feeding program. Andrews House and the Community Resource Center collaborated with other community agencies to provided a lunch time activity program that now serves over 50 children a day in the Woodward community.</b></p> <p><b>Information on agencies/services outside of Delaware county is being compiled by 6-12 Committee. This committee consists of staff from Health Department, HMG, MRDD, JFS, Juvenile Court, Children's Services and Mental Health providers. There are as many as 150 children that are participating in programs outside of Delaware County because we do not have the resources in the county to provide these types of service. A strategic plan is being developed to bring some of those programs into the community.</b></p> <p><b>The committee also worked together to collaborate with the schools and community agencies to establish a care team initiative. Delaware Hayes High School has developed Project Promise which brings community agencies together to provide services to students/families struggling with non academic barriers. Other schools in other districts in Delaware county are considering implementing this model.</b></p>

**o-6 Committee contacted the doctors on our HMG physicians list, surveying their current use of developmental screenings. No consistent tool screening tool was being used. Pilot on PEDS screening tool was recommended. Dr.'s Henderson, McDowell, Rumbalski and Spellman indicate that they are interested in PEDS tool. Dr. Henderson currently is using the PEDS tool in his office.**  
**o-6 Committee members were asked to present information about the PEDS tool to the Department of Family Medicine. Twenty-**

four doctors participated in the discussion. Dr. Henderson was in attendance and discussed the ease of the tool. Dr. Amy Newmeyer from Developmental & Behavioral Pediatrics at Children’s Hospital talked about the 2006 American Academy of Pediatrics guidelines which state that doctors perform developmental surveillance at every well child visit. She was a champion in our cause, encouraging the group to refer for early developmental intervention when screening results in concerns.

0-6 Committee surveyed Childcare centers. No consistent training was being provided to staff on use of the ASQ screening tool. Connie Nafziger from Nationwide Children’s Hospital trained child care center staff on ASQ/ASQ SE. 25 childcare providers from 10 centers participated in ASQ training.

**Multi System committee is compiling information on agencies/services outside of Delaware county that provide intervention services to Cluster children. Cluster children receive services from one or more agency. This committee consists of staff from MRDD, JFS, Juvenile Court, Children's Services and Mental Health providers. There are as many as 150 children that are participating in programs outside of Delaware County because we do not have the resources in the county to provide these types of service. A strategic plan is being developed to bring some of those programs into the community.**

**The Multi system committee also worked with the 6-12 Committee to collaborate with the schools to establish a care team initiative. Delaware Hayes High School has developed Project Promise which brings community agencies together to provide services to students/families struggling with non academic barriers. Other schools in other districts in Delaware county are considering implementing this model.**

**Another committee, the PEACE Collaborative, a coalition of prevention practitioners and school administrators representing all four Delaware County school districts, created a strategic in school prevention plan. The strategic plan is intended to guide the activities of the Collaborative over the next 2 – 3 years. The plan will coordinate a comprehensive and coordinated in school prevention programs impacting Delaware County children.**
